# 51 teams slug it out for playoff spots in Championship team events. International Fund Regional events begin. Today's sponsor: North Shore Bridge

17 teams in the CNTC-A have another day of round robin qualifying to determine the 8 teams that will start head to head knockouts in tomorrows quarter finals. Wang, Amoils, Oddy, Zhou, L'Ecuyer, Roche, Dimich, and Gartaganis currently hold the 8 playoff spots.

10 teams in the CWTC have been whittled down to 4 teams for the knockout semi finals starting today. Smith vs Tafler in SF1. Blank vs Angus in SF2.



In CNTC-B, 4 teams remain from the original 11 for the semi finals also starting today. Matchups are Mann vs Chuang and Pratt vs Segal.

In CNTC-C, 13 teams vied for 4 spots in todays semi finals. It is Furnemont vs Hong and Yang vs Qi.

Play commenced Saturday and continued Sunday. There are many players experiencing a championship event for the first time and their first exposure to playing behind screens. 60 screens were shipped here from Winnipeg for these Championships.

The International Fund Regional is specially allocated to the CBF and does not substitute for any District 19 Regionals. To play in Championship events, you must be a member of the CBF. However, the International Fund Regional games are open to anyone. CBF or ACBL membership is not required.

Bridge players are unusually blessed with tournaments this year. With the recently finished Regional in Victoria and the upcoming Penticton tournament in June, that is a Regional 3 months in a row. In addition, there is a local 4 day Sectional upcoming at the Queensborough community centre on the Victoria Day weekend.
